A resolution to increase government funding of

Whereas the Supreme Court recently ruled against race-based affirmative action;

Whereas college and university degrees have become a crucial part of resumes to find work;

Whereas minority groups are of a higher likelihood to receive a lower quality education;

Whereas admittance to college/university should be based on the merit of students' academic success given that every student has been given an equal opportunity to learn and succeed;

Whereas the right to an adequate K-12 education is fundamental in the development of children;

Whereas areas of lower average income regularly see a lower quality of education compared to the quality of education in areas with higher average income;

Whereas major faults within our society could be resolved with a higher level of education for all children across the country;

Whereas equality of opportunity is a fundamental principle in America and a significant part of that equality comes from equal education;

Whereas investing in the future of America as a whole would be not only worth the money but fundamental in continuing to move America in the right direction;

Whereas a high-level K-12 education is life-changing for those wise enough to take full advantage of it;

Whereas every student regardless of location, race, gender, religion, socio-economic class, or any other factor is deserving of a high-level equal education as a form of equality of opportunity in this America;

Where as equality of opportunity is fundamental in America.

Resolved, That The Senate -

(1)Recognizes the importance of funding K-12 education in America to promote equality of opportunity through equality of education. (2) Plans on passing legislature appropriating funds accordingly to allow for K-12 schools, regardless of average area income, to provide an equal and higher quality of education.
